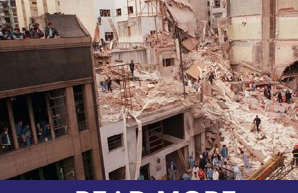

First Victims' Summit in Westminster

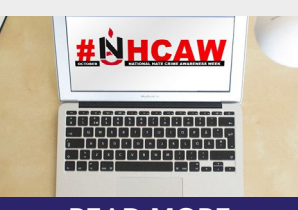

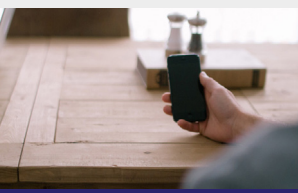
CST is proud to support the annual National Hate Crime Awareness Week. It was CST's pleasure to join several events during the week to promote education about hate crime and help those who have been affected.

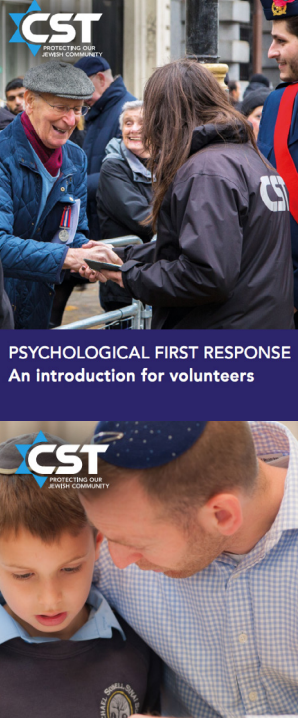

New Psychological First Response booklets

CST has recently created the CST's Psychological Response Team. The team responds to the psychological and emotional needs of the Jewish community after a major incident. The team is also available for deployment beyond the Jewish community, enabling CST to assist wider society in a major incident or crisis.

The [Psychological First Response: An introduction for volunteers](#) booklet has been designed to assist those within the team, as well as anyone who may respond to crisis, in dealing with individuals' possible psychological effects following a major incident.

The [Behavioural changes after a major traumatic incident](#) booklet is for people who have been affected - directly or indirectly - by a terror incident and for those treating them. It highlights common emotional and behavioural changes that may occur following the incident. It is important to emphasise that we all respond differently to stressful events.
